



## *FIFTH ANNUAL COBBLESTONE TOUR*

On Saturday, June 12, the fifth annual tour of cobblestone buildings will visit thirteen cobblestone houses in the Finger Lakes region near Geneva, New York.

This is the only tour of its kind in America for the cobblestone building is a trademark of upstate New York. In the 1830's and 1840's, hundreds of these buildings were built from Utica westward to the Niagara River. Each year the Cobblestone Society of Albion, New York sponsors this tour to raise funds for its restorations and museums.

The 1965 tour, held in cooperation with the Geneva Historical Society, includes an unusual variety of these rare homes from the most impressive Greek revival mansions to typical cobblestone farmhouses. Several of those opened are furnished with family heirlooms and antiques. Some of the stops offer a panoramic view of Seneca Lake and the hills beyond. The last house, on a hilltop near Rushville, presents a view of the Bristol Hills.

This unique motor tour begins at the historic Lafayette Inn on route 5 and 20 one mile west of Geneva. There the \$2.00 tickets and tour guide booklet, describing each house and mapping the route, can be obtained anytime after 11 A.M. on June 12th. From 1 - 5 P.M. hostesses will be stationed at each of the buildings which are to be opened.




### COBBLESTONE SOCIETY
