Information from James Cross, related by marriage to the Tiffanys

His grandfather died 1917, 93 years old. (born 1824)
When 16 he "split" stones for the windows of home-
stead. That dates house to about 1840

Land was bought from original Phelps - Gorham tract.
Original people around there the Chapmans, Tiffanys,
Brockelbank, Cascott and Pastelford.

Tiffany sold house to Pomeroy, then it went to
Stevely, now Morlier.

Brother of James Cross on West Lake Rd Canandaigua
Cousin Mrs. Yowell, South Lima, may know relatives of
Aunt Mrs. Minnie Doyle in Rochester (80 years old,
totally blind).

History of Ontario County 1893

Tiffany, Francis J. Hopewell, was born in Can. April 30, 1823,
a son of Edmund Tiffany, a native of Mass, who when
six years of age came with his parents, Zachariah and
Susanna Tiffany, to Can. Here the grand parents lived
and died. Edmund T. married Polly Jones and they had
one son and three daughters. He died in 1868 and his
wife died in 1865. Francis J. was reared on a farm
and educated in the common schools and Can. Academy.
He married Martha Farnsworth, native of Hopewell, and
they had one daughter, Mary E., who became Mrs. Henry

A. Darling. She died in 1883, leaving two children: Grace and Henry T. Grace died in 1883. Since 1880 Mr. Tiffany has resided on a part of what is known as the Bush estate. He is a Republican, and has been inspector fifteen years. He and his wife are members of the First Presbyterian Church of Can."

p. 115 "District #15 lies in the northeast corner of the
town. To this place came Zachariah Tiffany,
his wife Susannah, and eleven children, from Adams,
Mass. in the spring of 1800. The family settled near
the Farmington line, and the land owned by them
has been known, until recently, as the Tiffany
farm. On August 21, 1821, it was divided among
three sons, Olney, Zachariah and Samuel, all
of whom are dead. A grandson of Z., Sr., Francis J.
by name, has lived for the last fifteen years
upon a part of the old farm. The size of this family
suggests a reason for the rapidity with which
clearings were made, when all, to the smallest,
had his special task to do. The log house was their
original home. Here the entire family were incapac-
itated by sickness from ague, and the harvest
was kindly secured by the neighbors. A lime-kiln
was built upon the farm, and the lime was
marketed at the village of Canandaigua.

M.S. Poweroy has lived eight years upon the
farm once the property of Zachariah F. Tiffany,
and a part of the old estate of that family...."

Later on a cemetery w. of loc 57 is mentioned
with the names of Tiffany, Cassort, Brockelbank,
Shuler, DeBow. "Among the finest residences
in the district is the Burleigh place, now the property
of T.H. Williams, and the stone house erected in
1846 by Zachariah Tiffany, and now owned
by M.S. Poweroy.
