## Description:

<u>Structural</u>: 2-story, 5 bay federal style farmhouse faces road; center entrance flanked by two windows on each side with windows centered above lower openings. Gable ends have two windows down with 2 centered above them; tucked in gable were two small single paned windows. All openings have limestone lints and sills. A limestone water table on front and sides.

Masonry: "Variously colored field cobbles laid on a slight diagonal with simply tooled 'V' joints between stones. Smoothly hewn, untold limestone quoins ... and smooth stone lintels and sills articulate the door and window openings. Fenestration is symmetrical on the main block; all window openings are rectangular ... door is surrounded by ... half side-lights, simple wood panels, and square pilasters." Cobbles are also of various small sizes and shapes, are laid 4/Q on front and sides, with vertical joints pyramided.

"A two-story, five-bay cobblestone house (1229 Birdsey Road, town of Junius) was built in the 1830s or 1840s in the Federal style. Built by three different workmen, it perfectly illustrates typical construction methods of the time. The back was done by an apprentice, with large stones set in line that were far from straight. A journeyman then built the sides with smaller stones and straighter courses. The master mason built the front of the house using the smallest stones and presenting the home's most pleasing face to the road. ... The house has walls 24" thick."

JUNIUS, 6/16/2022 — When a fire destroyed Doris and Walter Wolf's beloved cobblestone house a little over a year ago, they were overwhelmed by the love and support they received from the community ... the historic Birdsey Road house that was gutted by fire on Jan. 10, 2018. The outer cobblestone walls have been preserved for a future user to build an interior inside ... The Wolfs had lived in the cobblestone house since 1977, raising a family and a host of animals, including sheep ... Doris said she left the house about 2:30 p.m. Wednesday the day of the fire. A neighbor called in the fire at 2:42 p.m. and firefighters from 15 companies battled the raging blaze until 8 p.m. before finally bringing it under control.

The roof and upper two floors had collapsed into the basement. "We lost everything. There was 800 pounds of wool in the attic from when I raised sheep that was smoldering for a long time," Wolf said. The Wolfs were classic keepers of documents, books and other printed materials accumulated over the years. That likely also provided fuel for the fire and were all destroyed. She said there was no way they could salvage their old home ...

As of this writing, the charred walls are still standing.
