Description:

Design details

2-story, 5-bay, center entrance w/2 windows each side and 5 windows centered above lower openings. Door was unusual in that it was recessed (not flush with the façade cobblestone wall) and it was framed with "lintels" along both sides of the door in addition to the lintel above the door, center (internal) chimney. A large 1½-story rear wing with another 1-story wing extending to the rear behind it (both wings cobblestone). They were partially covered with ivy, obscuring details. Gable ends were mirror images of each other: 2 windows down w/2 centered above them and a round medallion in the peak.

Limestone Q,L,S and watertable all sides of main block; 4/Q (all elevations, including the wing) and 7 courses below watertable to grade. Multi-colored, sized, shaped fieldstones used throughout; horizontal joints Vd, verticals pyramided. Lintels and sills extended past the edge of the windows 3 cobbles worth.

Overview:

It is unknown exactly when it was torn down or who the owner was at the time. It appears that brothers John and Timothy Dwyer were living in the house in the very early 1940s. John died in 1945, possibly after which it was initially sold. A "Mr Hoffman" came into possession sometime before 1955 and was still in possession of it when CFS was writing his 1966 *Cobblestone Masonry*. He indicated it had been demolished in the early 1960s. By 1960 the 125 acre farm site was owned by a trailer court, per Timothy Dwyer's obituary notice.

References:

DWP (1940-41): "Just over the line in Macedon is the Johnson house built by Walter Johnson in 1834. Limestone quoins, fieldstones 4/Q. House is falling into disrepair. **Mr Dwyer and his brother have lived there for 55 years.**"

Note: John Dwyer died 1945 (75); Timothy (age 72) died 1960—his obit said he was born in the cobblestone house "presently owned by a trailer court".

VK (1955): Various colored stones; horizontal joints Vd and verticals pyramids; regular, well cut limestone quoins and lintels; note the limestone columns at the entrance. "The quoins were drawn from the stone quarry at Ontario by oxen." VK documented it was owned by a "Mr Hoffman" at the time of his survey.

CFS (1966): "was demolished a few years ago". He references it as Johnson-Hoffman house.

It is unknown who initially developed the trailer court and when—maybe Hoffman; maybe Schiano.

In 1971 Gilbert M Schiano (Schiano Building Corp) sold the trailer court.

The site is now a large retail center and parking lot (15.77 acres, 2006). Correspondences with Town of Macedon historians helped pinpoint the best guess "footprint" of the cobblestone house; Coordinates: 43°03'52.4"N 77°22'08.4"W

Emails 3/21/2018, 5/1/2018, 5/2/2018, 2/22-23/2019 with Linda Braun (Macedon Historian) and additional research help from Dave Gardner (Macedon Historical Society) to pinpoint the location (footprint) of the house which is now part of the expansive Lowe's Store and parking lot (Macedon Plaza LLC). Aerial photos indicate the house was still standing in 1963 and gone after that. Handwritten note in Town folder "Razed 1963".

WALTER JOHNSON—Born 12/29/1796 in New Jersey; came to Macedon with his parents at the age of 12; learned the trade of blacksmith at Geneva; made considerable of the iron work for Auburn prison; was in the U.S. Army 1817 to 1821; married 9/23/1821 to Lydia Peters; followed blacksmithing for many years on the place now owned by Mrs David Brockway, Wayneport, the ring of his anvil sometimes heard all night, doing work for contractors on the Erie Canal; about 1829 bought the farm since known by his name; in 1860 rented the farm; bought the place of his old shop again, and lived there until 1878; then returned to his farm, where he died 1/15/1884. Among his papers is a lease of two pews in the Baptist church of Macedon for 99 years. During the Civil War he was intensely interested, and made it "red-hot" for any one who spoke against the government or the soldiers. When a committee traveled through Macedon for blankets for David P Richardson's troops in New York harbor, Walter Johnson bought new material, hired help to work all night, and the next day at noon gave to the committee *four large, new, double padded comforters.*"

Lydia) was laid to rest—he's not shown in any of the town's cemeteries. On p 139, in the section, "The Burial Grounds of Macedon", it states that there was a subscription to raise money to fence and improve the ground of the "Wayne Port Union Burying Ground" to which he made a large contribution.

"The death of Francis Dwyer, aged 27 years, occurred at his home early Saturday morning after a lingering illness of tuberculosis. Although he had been ill for some time, he was not confined to his bed, and his death came suddenly. Last summer was spent by him in the Adirondacks in an effort to regain his health. Mr Dwyer had lived his entire life in this community ... He is survived by his parents, Mr and Mrs Dennis Dwyer, four brothers John, Dennis, and Timothy of Macedon, Edmund of Canandaigua; five sisters ... "Dwyer. The Dwyers were really a Macedon, Wayne Co family, but the younger generation came to the Fairport schools, as their home was just over the line of the east boundary of Perinton. The house was a cobblestone on the left going east on Palmyra Road. The house was torn down to make way for a trailer park. This is a third generation family here. Dennis Dwyer Sr, had son Dennis Jr, who was born and lived here. Dennis Jr married Elizabeth Carney, daughter of John and Margaret Biracree Carney."
