

10. - HELLEN MOTLEY HOUSE

Now owned by Hellen Motley and occupied by Mrs. Bernard Morse this quaint home is located on the corner of the Ontario Center and Lake Road. It was built about 1834. At one time it was a summer home. Later it became known as the Teet's Homestead and after that the Wickes Place. Part of it once burned down and was rebuilt which accounts for the unusual combination of bricks, shingles, and cobblestone.

STONES: The stones on the front are small, measuring $1\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{1}{2}$ -2 .

JOINTS: The horizontal V is 3-4 inches high and the vertical are pyramids. A course is $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

MORTAR: The mortar is fine in texture.

QUOINS: The quoins are regular untooled red stone.

LINTELS: There are no lintels.

SIDE: Light colored lake stones were used at the sides.
