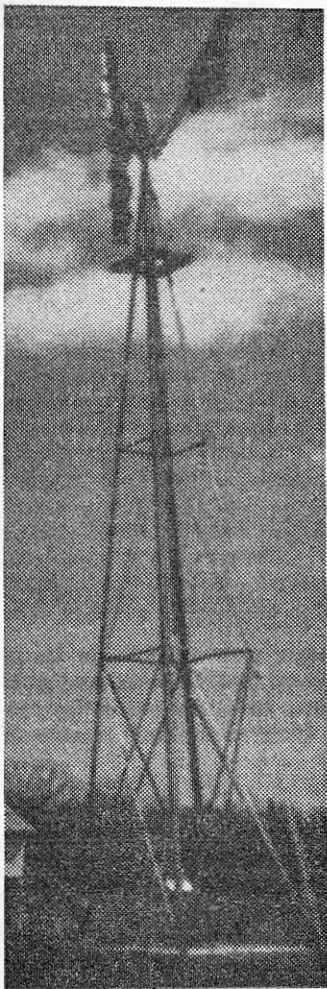


Cobblestone House Draws Sightseers

PHELPS — Seventeen hundred people attended the open house at the Lawrence C. Gleason restored cobblestone home east of Phelps yesterday. The open house was scheduled from 2 to 6 p.m. but many were there ahead of that hour and long lines continued throughout the afternoon.

People from a wide area of the state came to see the home. Mr. Gleason gave the open house for the benefit of the Explorer Post No. 46 Boy Scouts and Troop 215 Cadette Scouts.
