

Dear Mr. & Mrs Horning.

I have found the reference to the Cobblestone House. It is on page 45, of section 3, Family Sketches, in Landmarks of Oswego County, published by D. Mason and Co., 1895 (Syracuse). It reads as follows: "Mr. Robinson now owns the homestead of Daniel Pratt, on which is standing and in use today one of the most unique houses in the county, having been built by Daniel Pratt about 1845, and is composed entirely of cobblestones, none of which is larger than a turkeys egg." Probably that date is more accurate than the one I gave you.

Daniel Pratt was born in 1795, in Brattleboro, Vermont and came to what is now Oswego county about 1817. My name was Sylvia Pratt, child of Charles A Pratt, who was the child of Charles B. Pratt, who was the child of Daniel Pratt, referred to above.

William Coleman, Pulaski, N.Y. has a "New Topographical Atlas" of Oswego county, published by C.K. Stone, Philadelphia, 1867, which shows the cobblestone house occupied by "Mrs Pratt" and the next farm north (still in the Pratt family and occupied by Don Pratt) as being occupied by C. B. Pratt. I assume the Mrs Pratt was the mother of C.B. Pratt and widow of Daniel Pratt.

If I ever get any more information I will pass it on to you.
