Description:

Design details:

The long side of the 1½ -story house faces the road. As originally built, it had a center entrance flanked by two windows each side. Five decorative grills were evenly spaced across the the cornice. Foundation was cut stone 4 blocks high requiring 4 risers to the entrance. There was one basement window on each side of the door in the foundation course each having a lintel of cut stones set vertically. The right (east) gable end had an attached wing (cannot tell if frame or cobblestone). The opposite gable end had a window toward the front of the side and a door toward the back. Each opening had a window centered above it. Between the windows in the gable was (is) a decorative oval ornament with a perimeter of tiny cobbles.

Masonry details:

Small red rounded lake stones 5/Q on façade, similar on west gable end, except multicolored lake cobbles set on a left leaning bias; on back wall larger multicolored mix of lake and fieldstones set 3 or 4/Q in nearly as neat rows as on the other elevations. Horizontal joints are Vs, verticals pyramids. Light colored and fine textured mortar. Tooled limestone quoins, Wooden lintels and sills.

Overview

"Dr Sprague" is indicated on the 1858 atlas. He was married in 1849 to Mary Bennett, the daughter of Dr Josiah Bennett. Although there is no name associated with the cobblestone building on the 1853 map, it can safely be assumed that this was Josiah Bennett's residence.¹ 1874 map indicates "M H Bennett"—Myron H Bennett, son of Dr Josiah & Ruth Bennett. 1904 shows "Dr & Mrs W. W. Ward Res". Dr Westel Willoughby Ward "married Miss Mary Appolinia Bennett of Williamson and they resided in the Myron Bennett house on West Main street during their married life."²

In 1939 Charles Van Maldeghem and John J Fox opened the Cobblestone Service Station featuring Texaco products. It remained in use as a service station until is was abandoned several decades ago.

Dr. Lathrop S. Josiah was born in Cheshire, England, 1788. When he was 6 years old, his parents chartered a ship to travel to Hudson, New York. He studied medicine in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. At 21, he set out on horse for western New York.

He was the second physician in town in 1815, Dr. Bigelow being the first. Josiah married Ruth Reeves. She was 17, thirteen years younger than he. Dr. Bennett participated in the establishment of the First Presbyterian Church in Williamson, and he and Ruth Reeves were the first couple to be married in the new church. They had four children: Myron, Charles, John Paul (who became a Wayne County Sheriff), and Mary.

Josiah was appointed Postmaster to Williamson in 1841. Josiah died in 1850, having lived his entire adult life in Williamson.

Deceased was born in Cato, his father being a physician of that place. He was educated in the public schools and the Oswego normal school, where he was graduated. He took a course in the Jefferson Medical College

and practiced medicine in his native town for a time and then removed to Lyons, where he was associated with Dr Bottoms. While there he was called to Williamson to counsel with Dr Josiah Bennett, a leading practitioner here at that time, and met his daughter, Miss Mary Bennett, to whom he was married shortly after in 1849. The same year he took up his residence in Williamson, where he has since lived. They had three children. His wife died in 1878. A son, Dr J. A. Sprague died March 9, 1897 from which time his aged father commenced to rapidly decline in health. A daughter, Mrs Collier, and an adopted daughter, Miss Mamie Sprague, survive him. He was a prominent and active member of the Presbyterian Church."

Lathrop S and Mary Sprague are interred in Newark Cemetery. A nice obituary notice is posted on Dr L S Sprague's findagrave writeup.

Myron H Bennett

Myron H Bennett, son of Josiah and Ruth Bennett. He died in 1887 outliving his wife, Mary E, and daughters Ellen M (d. 1858) and Julia (d.1863). They all rest in Pleasant View Cemetery (https://wayne.nygenweb.net/census/1870williamsoncen11.html). He was survived by his daughter Mary A Bennett Ward — wife of Dr. Willoughby W Ward. "... That Myron H. Bennett, the decedent above-named ... departed this life on the 9th day of November 1887, leaving him surviving Mary Appolonia Ward as his only heir-at-law and net of kin. ... I hereby will and bequeath unto my daughter Appolonia M Ward all of my balance and remainder of my estate ... I further direct that if any of my estate at the decease of my said daughter and she shall die without leaving living issue, then in that case I direct that one half thereof shall be paid to Willoughby W Ward, husband of my said daughter, and the other half thereof to be divided equally share and share alike between my nephews and nieces ..."

<u>Epilogue</u>: In 2022 it continues its slow erosion after decades of abandonment. The roof is long gone, most of the front and back walls have fallen in, and dangerously the floor is completely gone. The gable wall attached to the frame service shop is about ¼ gone. Surprisingly, the opposite gable end is intact and in remarkably good shape (8/28/2022) with no signs of cracks or other deterioration.
