OVERLOOKED ORLEANS: Though also a newsroom, tobacco was prominent merchandise in store

ALBION — An old image shows the interior of the Dowd Newsroom located at 13 East Bank St., circa 1907.

The business was once owned by Charles Dowd and operated with assistance from his brother George during the early portion of the 20th century. Before opening the business, Charles was employed as a railroad laborer and worked on vari-1890s until he broke his leg in 1897.

placed over other advertising pieces that reads "Orleans County Fair - Albion, NY - Sept. 18, 19, 20, 21 - 1907." Assuming Mr. Dowd did not forget to take this poster down for two years, we can easily date the image.

Located just in view behind the U.S. Marine tobacco crate is a snow shovel, so there is a possibility that the image was taken during the earlier portion of 1907.

Charles Dowd is standing behind the counter, approximately 46 years old at the time, with his derby placed on the glass case. To his Main Street where Fischer's right are Albion Police Justice Henry C. Tucker, Louis his ownership until his own

has placed his hat on the adjacent glass case.

On Nov. 8, 1941 Dowd suffered a massive heart attack while listening to the Notre Dame - Navy football game. A passionate Fighting Irish fan, the 76-year-old's heart could not handle the excitement of the 20-13 victory over the "Middies.

After his death, his brother-in-law Charles Kellogg took over the business before it was sold to Newell Maxon of Medina. The business was then sold to Carl Fischer and relocated to N. Newsroom operated under death in 1963.
