## Membership Dinner Recap

A big thank you is also extended to all of the members who donated items to be sold at the dinner. The item that attracted the most attention in the auction was a Turf Pro Lawn Service gift certificate donated by Jake Stinson of Albion. This item went for \$200 above the fair market value.

## Adding a Cobblestone Wall



Have you ever considered adding a cobblestone wall to your modern house? Mason, Paul Briggs of Ithaca, specializes in historic masonry and offers this suggestion.

"The cost to build a cobblestone house would be not too prohibitive if the core was built in concrete block or or even wood frame and a veneer put over it. The veneer should be at least 4 inches thick with plenty of ties. There is a 1-1/2 story cobblestone house on Ridge Road a few mile west of the Hamlet of Gaines that I am confident was built as a veneer over wood frame. They used cut nails as the ties. Even shelves of wood at intervals up the inside of the wall work can stiffen and shore up a thin cobblestone wall. Wood walls with thinner stone veneer show up everywhere and single layer brick veneer has been used for over 100 years. If there was a way to cut cobbles quickly and cheaply to two inches, then panels could be manufactured and competently installed; though craftsmen would have to do the proper mortar. It would cost about \$5,000 to do the face of a one story 3-bay house."

Closer to home, the Cobblestone Museum's National Landmark Cobblestone School (shown above) is constructed with a veneer of lake-washed cobbles over a wood frame.

## Potter District #5 Cobblestone "Round Jug" Schoolhouse

On a sunlit October afternoon amid the picturesque rolling hills with their now colorful long views, I headed down to Middlesex in Yates County where Elaine Hilton and her husband Jim were awaiting me. Both have long family roots in this area of Yates County and were about to help me in my research of the Potter District #5 Schoolhouse. It had succumbed to a fire in 1920 — 100 years ago. In fact, Elaine was about to share with me a first-hand account of the long-gone "cobblestone jug schoolhouse." How was this possible?

Elaine is secretary of the Middlesex Heritage Group. Her mother, Sophia Voorhees Emerson, was just 10 years old at the time of the fire. Nonetheless, as an adult she had clear memory of the schoolhouse and her days spent there as a very young student. What's more, so did many of her friends. Later in life she set out to document the schoolhouse in book form. She assembled school records and pictures, and she did interviews with fellow students educated in the odd round

building. She took an interesting tack in writing it: she narrates from the perspective of the school door. The opening paragraphs begin:

"My life as a school door was spent as a part of a round schoolroom, which was round, because the building itself was one round room. I was a heavy, heavy wooden door made by a carpenter."

The 30-page book is comprehensive in its scope. It includes a drawing of the interior layout and has an extensive description of the seating arrangements, the high windows positioned so students couldn't peer out, even a mention of the outhouses out back. There are also a couple pages of sometimes entertaining snippet-comments from those students of long ago. It is a remarkable rare find!

Because this book was never intended to be published, just a small handful of copies were made. Elaine and her sister, Scarlett Emerson, have graciously donated one of them to the Cobblestone Society Museum.

Elaine and Jim spent the entire afternoon with me. They had all the information assembled, including original photographs and newspaper clippings. Like many others in this largely rural area, both are from old families who settled in the area in the 1800s. Their expansive knowledge about the history and the life and times of people in those days served to enhance the documentation that laid before me across the tables.

The Middlesex Heritage Group is located in the Middlesex Town Hall. It is comprised of a small group of volunteers dedicated to protecting and preserving the historical records of their community and surrounding area. They are doing an outstanding job of it!

I extend my sincere thanks to Elaine and Jim Hilton for treating me to a fine afternoon in their picturesque community of Middlesex, NY.


Chicken French and Filet of Sirloin. The main event, a live auction, will follow dinner.

# Victorian Mourning Art Exhibit—Spring 2022

An exhibit to showcase mourning art prominent in the late 19th century in America is currently on exhibit in the Proctor Room.

Many pieces from the Museum collection are featured, including objects that display the motifs of angels, wreaths, pillows and lambs. One of the most unique artifacts is a beautiful tombstone donated to the Museum by the Memorial Art Gallery in Rochester that depicts a stand of weeping willows and an obelisk pointing to

The Proctor Award is given annually to someone who goes above and beyond to assist the Museum in an extraordinary manner. This year's recipient, Trustee Toni Plummer, was praised by Trustee Brenda Radzinski at the November 6th meeting, where she described Toni's contributions that led to her selection. Described as someone with an understanding that the Museum should both "educate as well as entertain," Toni spearheaded activities on both fronts. She arranged outings for Board members to visit other museums to learn how they've navigated issues that are relevant to the Cobblestone Museum's future goals and growth. Her idea of hosting future Ladies Luncheons at the Vagg House led to a successful trial run this past fall, with help from some fellow trustees. Brenda gave a nod to Toni's past efforts organizing the ever-popular Christmas Tour of Homes, a pre-COVID holiday favorite.

Toni led the Marketing Committee and recommended a number of products to sell in the Museum's gift shop last season, especially through partnership with regional vendors. Merle's

maple products, Laura's honey, and Watt Farms jellies and jams were added to the merchandise inventory, along with a variety of teas, kitchen items and soaps. Toni's own handiwork supplied some handmade soaps and unique jewelry to be sold. She plans to continue implementing her creative suggestions when a new gift shop is opened within the future Cobblestone Visitors Center.

Toni also served on the Nominating, Personnel and Strategic Planning Committees in the past year, as well as filling the annual opening for a designated trustee to serve on the Executive Committee.

I presented the 2021 Volunteer of the Year Award to Gail Johnson. Earning over 160 volunteer service hours since January, she assumes year-round commitment as a volunteer beyond her duties as Membership Secretary, an Executive Board position. 





