The Art of the Victorian Crazy Quilt—A Virtual Lecture

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Plan your visit to the Cobblestone Museum!

I'm very pleased to announce that antique quilt expert, Betsey Telford-Goodwin, 37 years in business as owner of Rocky Mountain Quilts, will share her expertise of antique quilts with our virtual audience on Saturday afternoon, January 27 at 2 pm EST. Launched in Palisade, Colorado, her enterprise relocated to York, Maine in 1997 when she purchased an 18th century home and turned its barn into her shop. She presently employs three women to make custom quilts and undertake restoration projects and adds, "My shop, containing almost 700 antique quilts, is a destination for people from as far away as Australia." Betsey is qualified to provide professional appraisals for antique quilts and is a member of the Antiques Council of America, the Maine Antiques Dealers Assn. (MADA), the New Hampshire Dealers Assn. (NHDA), the American Society of Interior Designers (ASID) and the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiques (SPNEA).

A native Bostonian, Betsey was educated at the Beaver Country Day School and graduated from UMASS, with the career goal to teach English before her true vocation emerged. Betsey shares, "My passion for quilts started as art pieces...graphic, visually comforting and exquisitely executed. Four mint condition quilts started my business." Her clients needed quilts to provide what's restoration work. After developing a method of restoration, she taught talented hand sewers

this art. "The 1" needle they use is even difficult to thread! There were yard sales and antiques shops where I purchased all the genuine antique fabrics I could find. Traveling back East made it possible to find much needed older fabrics dating back as far as the 18th Century. Also purchased were 'whole cloth' quilts which I would take apart for fabric. Today I have what may be the largest collection of antique fabrics outside a museum in the U.S. Taking apart these guilts enabled me to learn the techniques used in their construction. Yes, I am self-taught. Luckily my education, combined with geographical background, enabled me to educate myself. Of course, over the years I have brain stormed with others in my field, always appreciated and widening my knowledge."

Betsey has been featured at the Paducah International Quilt Show (Ky.), on the Discovery Channel, New England TV shows and in over 30 magazines at home and abroad. In the States, she's participated at The Houston International Quilt Show, the NY 67th Armory Show and dozens more. She's traveled to Japan, the UK and other European destinations to both lecture and sell her remarkable antique quilts.


To set the stage for her presentation, Betsey relayed, "Emblematic of the 4th quarter of the 19th Century Victorian Era is the Victorian Crazy Quilt. This very sophisticated quilt is a symbol of an era when there was no limit to embellishment of one's home or other environment, either indoors or out. Women, who did not have the right to vote, could create textile art that still amazes us today. The vast aspects of these creations will happily be shared."

Betsey and her husband, dedicated webmaster, enjoy running the business out of their New England home. The two are collaborating to provide what's needed for her debut virtual lecture. Register today at the Museum's Events webpage to become part of her first internet audience.

An example of a 19th century painting currently on exhibit is this Peter B. West oil painting, "Twin Prize Winning Steers," from 1896. The historic photo at right shows Stephen Hallock with his twin steers. On the back it states: "Prize steers bred by Stephen Hallock, Albion, N.Y. and exhibited at State Fair, Syracuse, N.Y. Weight 8040 lbs. Calved August 1881, 12 feet 6 inches long, 14 feet around the chests, 3 feet 2 inches across the hips." The West painting could have been done when the steers were fifteen years old. The painting and photo were donated to the Museum in 2023 by Beryl DeMeyer of Rochester.


Cobblestone Landmarks

Built in 1850, this house at 517 Prospect St., Beloit, Wisconsin, was the residence of the first president of Beloit College. It is a Wisconsin Landmark and one of the finest examples of cobblestone masonry in the state of Wisconsin. It is owned and maintained by the Beloit Chapter of the National Daughters of the American Revolution. There are 26 known cobblestone houses in Wisconsin.

No doubt you've heard of the total solar eclipse taking place on Monday, April 8 of this year. In Orleans County totality is anticipated between 3:19 and 3:23 pm. It's been reported that because our location lies in the direct path to view this rare event, an estimated 375,000 – 500,000 visitors will come to our area to experience this historical occurrence.

The Cobblestone Museum is hopeful that members of the Cobblestone Society, friends of the Museum and visitors from near and far will consider joining us for some planned events from April 5 – 8, between 10 am and 3pm on Friday – Sunday, and 10 am until the "main event" concludes late Monday afternoon. Plans will be fine-tuned in the weeks ahead, so visit our website's Events page regularly to watch as full details emerge. Here are some preliminary details.

Our S.O.L.A.R. weekend is an acronym to remind you of what's expected. "S" is for shopping. Our Museum's gift shop, Holiday Shoppe and Used Books building will be open for browsing and making purchases. "O" stands for the Olde Tyme Photo opportunity that will be available. Put on some provided bygone era accessories and create a souvenir photo. Children can visit our Cobble the Mouse photo booth, too! "L" is for Learning. Listen to our docents share the history of select campus buildings and hear storytellers share historical accounts from the past. Our exhibit rooms will be open as well so guests can learn about 19th century coverlets of Orleans County and Victorian Mourning Art & Sundries. Blacksmithing demonstrations will take place in the Blacksmith Shop at designated times throughout the weekend. "A" means an auto show will be held on Saturday and/or Sunday afternoon. A variety of classic, antique and sports cars will be parked on our grounds for you to see up close and talk about with their owners. "R" is for refreshments, which will be sold on Monday, Solar Eclipse Day. Pizza by the slice, popcorn, cobblestone candy, and beverages will be sold individually or as part of our S.O.L.A.R. admission package rate for \$25 per person. Regular admission is \$9 per adult guest, \$6 for teens and students with a valid college ID, and children 12 and under enter FREE with an accompanying

Award Winners Lauded at the 63rd Cobblestone Society Annual Meeting

In 2016, the tradition of providing deserving members of the community with awards to honor noteworthy accomplishments, successes, or partnerships began. Worthy individuals or groups who helped the Museum grow in some way leaving a positive impact were acknowledged. The following award winners received certificates of recognition on November 4, 2023 at the Gaines-Carlton Community Church during the Annual Meeting of the Cobblestone Society.

Outgoing Board of Trustees president, Erin Anheier, received the John Proctor Award, named for the founder of Childs who helped establish the Cobblestone Church. The award is given to someone who goes above and beyond to assist the Cobblestone Museum in an extraordinary manner. During Erin's tenure she brought in \$229,000 to benefit the Museum through written grant proposals and other means. Concerned with historic preservation, she's served on the Buildings & Grounds Committee and aided recognition of the Vagg House and Gaines Basin cobblestone schoolhouse on the National Register of Historic Places. She's fostered the Museum's relationship with the Landmark Society of Western NY.

Ginny Kropf was awarded the Community Partner of the Year award. A seasoned local news reporter, Ginny has been writ-

ing articles about the Museum's many activities and programs over the years, often in advance of events to spark interest. In 2023 she wrote more than a dozen articles to inform and inspire her readers on the Orleans Hub and Lockport Union-Sun & Journal.

The Business Partner of the Year award was presented to Lora Partyka of Partyka Farms in Kendall. Lora has graciously provided financial contributions or goods for several years to support programs held at the Museum. Not a penny was accepted by Lora in exchange for pumpkin seeds and dozens of ears of corn-on-the cob donated from Partyka Farms to aid the Museum's fundraising activities.

Mary Zangerle was the recipient of the Volunteer of the Year award. A retired librarian, member of the Medina Garden Gals and volunteer since 2016, Mary has worn many hats to fulfill needs related to campus activities. She recently found her niche assisting staff with administrative duties – reorganizing the Resource Library, maintaining some computer records, filing and more. She volunteers year-round, earning on average 50 – 100 hours of service per year.

Our Eclipse Story (Virtual Presentation)

"The History of Pullman"-A Virtual Lecture





Writing Western New York's Eclipse Story Together, February 22, 2024 at 7pm.

A Virtual Lecture presented by Debra Ross, Chair of Rochester's Eclipse Task Force, and Co-Chair of the AAS National Solar Eclipse Task Force

Having witnessed 2017's Great American Eclipse in Missouri and understanding its implications for the Rochester area in 2024, Debra started the Rochester Eclipse Task Force. The task force now has over 750 members across many sectors, and the Rochester area has become known as the most engaged U.S. region preparing for totality. After the American Astronomical Society's Solar Eclipse Task force held its meeting in the Rochester region in 2022, Debra was asked to co-chair the National task force to help other communities learn from Rochester's preparations.

Ms. Ross will discuss what's going to happen in our area on April 8, what makes it such a transformational experience, how to experience the eclipse safely, and how everyone should prepare to craft their own eclipse story, making the most of this moment in their own personal history and in Western NY's history. She emphasizes, "Life is about writing your own story and you want this...to be a chapter that you look back on and you talk about for the rest of your life."

She'll also tell the story of how Rochester's Eclipse Task Force has carefully crafted Rochester's eclipse narrative for the past seven years so that it will be a uniquely memorable and positive chapter in Rochester's 21st-century story.



George Pullman, born in Brockton, New York in 1831, revolutionized rail travel through the company he created, the Pullman Palace Car Company.

Guest speaker Andrew Bullen (shown above), resident of Pullman, Illinois and historian, has written extensively about George M. Pullman. Among his many accomplishments, Mr. Bullen's undertaken projects for the Pullman House History Project and the Historic Pullman Foundation in Chicago.

He shares that there are five "big" stories of Pullman – George and his family, the Company and its products, the town of Pullman, the people of Pullman, and labor and race issues. Employees of the Company were encouraged to live in the model industrial town of Pullman, now a Chicago neighborhood. His virtual lecture will encompass an overview of these topics, including the complex story of labor and race relations as seen through the lens of the company.

Mark your calendar to join us on Thursday, March 21 at 7 pm EST for a discussion about Mr. Pullman, the Western New York native who once worshiped at our Cobblestone Church, memorialized his parents through the Pullman Memorial Universalist Church in Albion, and created a legacy that remains a part of America's history.
