On March 7, 1788, two important pieces of legislation were enacted which provided for dividing the State into counties and dividing the counties of this State into towns. These laws guided the development of all communities in New York State.

In order to mark the bicentennial of these laws

and to promote the significance of the history of the individual communities, which collective is the history of New York State, the Alliance of Historical Service Agencies will sponsor Community Heritage Year 1988.

The Alliance includes the Western New York Association of Historical Agencies, the Regional Council of Historical Agencies, the Federation of Historical Services, and the Lower Hudson Conference of Historical Agencies and Museums. They will encourage citizens to celebrate community heritage by presenting and coordinating public programs and activities throughout 1988.
