

Methods of spraying orchards have vastly hanged over the past 90 years. This photo was ken around the turn of the century in the Town of arlton and shows Albert Allen and his hired man atrick Drennan, spraying trees. The picture was happed by a Dr. Ferno to illustrate a book on the are of shade trees. At the time, Dr. Ferno was orking with the Department of Forestry in rashington, D.C. and was particularly interested the care and culture of shade trees.

This same kind of spraying apparatus was used ammonly at the time for spraying orchards. It consted of a hand-powered pump and two oak bards transported on a horsedrawn wagon. The use and nozzle was attached to a long bamboo ble which could be held high to reach into the tree ps. Note here that burlap blankets where thrown for the backs of the horses to keep off the spray.

In the background is the Allen Farmstead which was removed several years ago to make way for Lake Ontario Parkway and bridge over Oak Orchard creek.

An example of this kind of early spraying equipment is on display at the Farmer's Hall in the Cobblestone Museum Complex. It consists of a large cask with a hand pump mounted on top. Attached is the hose and bamboo pole. Information cast on the pump notes: "Empire King 1896 Fieldforce Pump Co. Lockport, N.Y. Pat. July 19, 1892."

Also displayed in the Farmer's Hall is a vitriol crusher used for pulverizing blue vitriol crystals which was used as a common spray material years ago. The Cobblestone Museum Complex is open June 23 to Labor Day Tue.-Sat. 11-5 and 1-5 Sundays. During September and October the museum is open Sunday 1-5. Group tours are accepted by appointment April through October and the Annual Old Timers Fair is scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 11, 1-5.
