The other pictures show the circus parawhich followed. Zebras and elephants plod rough the four corners in downtown Albion as we e the Marine Bank building in the background. Pars ago whenever the circus came to town, ere was always a circus parade to show off fore the big show. The animal cars at the siding dicate "Walter L. Main Shows." The Orleans punty Fairgrounds on West State Street was here such events took place in Albion.

Seeing the elephants on parade here I'm minded of a story my second grade teacher Miss arian Hassett, told about an elephant. It seems at a circus parade occurred somewhere and a nall boy standing at a corner did something ean to the elephant who passed by. Several ears later when the boy was much older the circus returned to his town and he stood at the same erner as the same elephant on parade passed.
