

THE TRANSIT LINE

Transit Road is so called because it is a transit ne which was run with a transit instrument in concection with astronomical observations. This is a uperior device to the magnetic needle in the urveyor's compass as it would have too many ariations for running a meridian line. The transit ne is the only straight boundary line which cuts ntirely across our county. It divides the towns of endall, Murray and Clarendon on the east from e towns of Carlton, Gaines, Albion and Barre on e west.

It is called the East Transit to distinguish it from similarly surveyed meridian passing through ockport, which is called the West Transit. The ying down of this line was a slow and laborious peration. It involved nothing less than felling a rip of timber three or four rods wide from the Pensylvania Line to Lake Ontario to give unobructed range to the miniature telescope of the ansit. This required, besides three surveyors, a onsiderable force of axemen. On most of the line I hands camped where night over took them in ie unbroken wilderness. All the summer and utumn of 1797 was consumed in running the first ighty miles of the transit meridian, there being bout thirteen miles remaining undone on the 2nd of November.

The surveyor in charge of this work was Joseph Ilicott. He was born in Bucks County Pennsylvaia in 1756. In 1770 the family removed to Maryand and founded Ellicott's Mills on the Patapsco iver. Joseph was taught surveying by his brother, ndrew, who was afterward Surveyor-General of the United States and professor of mathematics at Vest Point. He assisted the latter in laying out the lty of Washington. The remaining years of his usiness career were chiefly spent in the service



of the Holland Land Company.

The photo accompanying this article shows the historic marker denoting the transit line. It is located in the town of Murray on the south east corner of the intersection of Transit Road and Ridge Road (104) and states the following:
