A REMINDER OF WAR

During World War II, now almost 50 years ago, the Court House lawn was also made a spectacle. It that time it was virtually turned into a junk yard in upport of the war effort abroad. Scrap drives of its sort helped build patriotism and brought the ar closer to the people at home. In this manner most every individual could participate by brounging in their attics, cellars and barns to find ink metal to donate.

Along with the scrap there was also propagana to catch the eye of everyone who passed by. A termometer attached to a nearby tree stated: Help Heat Hitler." This had a goal of 250 tons for ur local residents to reach. Nearby, another large gn was lettered with "Help It Grow — Scrap Will /in The War — Add Yours." Perhaps the most zarre part of the whole display was an effigy of itler placed in a casket propped up against a tree. bove the effigy, another sign was placed which tated "Reserved for Hitler."
