Pictured above is the WATERPORT UNION CHOOL. What follows has been gleaned from ne "Annual Catalogue" of this school "Adopted by ne Board of Education - 1910", listing general iformation, rules and regulations.

Some will be found to be similar, some is quite ifferent from our present generation. The list is erein being printed in the entirety from the

DUTIES OF TEACHERS

. All teachers shall thoroughly acquaint themelves with the various rules and regulations dopted by the Board, and use their best efforts in arrying them out for the good of the school.

All teachers shall be in their respective rooms at :30 a.m. and at 1:00 p.m. In case of an emergeny or sickness, which is liable to cause absence om duty, the teacher should report at once to the rincipal.

Teachers shall be responsible for good order in heir respective rooms at all times, and with the rincipal, exercise a general supervision over upils on the school premises. Their authority is

ot limited to school hours.

. Teachers shall strive to prevent the school uilding or furniture from being injured or defaced, nd upon discovery of any injury immediately aport the same, with facts, to the Principal.

Teachers shall endeavor to secure a uniform amperature of 68 degrees F in their rooms, and

ive special attention to the protection, health, and omfort of pupils.

The physical necessities of pupils should be arefully regarded. Urge regular habits that will not

onflict with good management.

The faculty in 1910 consisted of F.D. Fairbank, rincipal; Ina B. Knollin, Preceptress; Lois M. ones, Intermediate; and Amy Strickroot, Primary.

RULES GOVERNING PUPILS
Attendance - All pupils are required to attend chool punctually and regularly. In case of tardiess or absence an excuse from parent or guaran, in writing or in person, shall be necessary on the pupils return to school. The irregular

pupil cannot do his work satisfactorily and must of necessity fall into a lower grade. Sickness of the pupil or in the family, or some pressing emergency are the only legitimate causes of absence.

2. Assembling and dismissal - Pupils shall not assemble about the school building at an unreasonable time before the beginning of sessions or remain after dismissal only by permission. Only in case of necessity or request by parent or guardian shall the pupil be excused before the regular closing hour. Pupils may be detained after the after-noon session for a reasonable length of time for the failure in recitation or lost time.

Deportment - Pupils are required to conform to the regulations of the school; to obey promptly and courteously all directions of teachers; to be respectful and orderly in demeanor, diligent in study, kind and obliging to schoolmates; to give proper attention to cleanliness of person and keep the desks and floor in a neat condition.

Pupils must avoid all intercourse, verbal or written, during school hours, without permission of the

teacher in charge.

4. Tobacco - The use of tobacco in any form whatever by teachers or pupils is forbidden at any time in the school building or on the school grounds.
5. Injuring school property - Pupils being guilty of injuring public or private school property shall pay in full for damages, in default of which they may be suspended from school. Any pupil who shall on or around the school premises write any improper language, draw obscene pictures, cut, mark or deface any school property, shall be punished according to the offense and shall be liable to civil prosecution.

The Board of Education in 1910 consisted of A.J. Sargent, J.J. Plowman, and Robert Rackham.

Officers appointed by this Board were: A. James Sargent, President of the Board; R.W. Rackham, Secretary; Wm. H. Parker, Collector; Truant Officer.
