> Town of Albion Edith Anderson, Historian

Restoration of the Annis Cemetery was comleted on the Riches Corners Road. The accomanying photo shows the refurbished gate which ost \$10 around 1905. A new water line extension ras put in from Butts Road to Transit Road. The hristian Center Church took over Kingdom Hall hile the Jehovah Witnesses built a new Kingdom lall just west of Mt. Albion. An addition was made the Bayex Plant and a new ARC housing com-lex was built on King Street. Likewise, a multiillion dollar annex was completed at the Albion orrectional Facility. A day care center for children f farm workers was built on the Old Fair Grounds. serious fire did around \$200,000 damage to loore Nesbitt auto dealership.

Town of Kendall

Alida Clow, Historian Supervisor Michael Paduchak retired after erving the town for 32 years. On April 6 Kendall tarted its recycling program with "pushing" from rea Girl Scouts. This past year cable TV came to endall and almost everyone who wanted it now as it installed. The renovation and addition to the endall Town Hall was also completed. Finally, ke other municipalities, Kendall has also experenced inconvenience with bridges being rebuilt. he one on 237 is now open but the one on 272 is osed for repairs.

Town of Clarendon Alan Isselhard, Historian

A March 4th ice storm ravaged the town and everything east of Clarendon. Power was out and basements were flooded. The Clarendon Fire Co. answered many, many calls to have cellars pumped out due to inoperative sump pumps. Many people in town had their wells go dry which has created many problems for them. Others are concerned about the possible expansion of the Genesee LeRoy Stone Corp. creating a more disasterous effect on the water situation. Some people have had above ground water storage tanks placed in their garages to enable them to at least flush toilets and take showers. Work also progressed on the Clarendon Historical Museum, the former Manning School House.

Louis Metz died which caused the closing of the Metz Brothers Clothing Store, the oldest business on Main Street.

This year was a year of expansion of Albion. The census showed a population of 5,829 up 932 since 1980. More people and more jobs created more business — Super Duper expanded and Oak Orchard Clinic built a new office on the corner of Hamilton and West Avenue where a little business complex was developing. The West Seneca Developmental Center built a community residence on North Main Street and Northwoods Apartments was built just north of the village.
