
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## "LUMINARIES IN THE FIRMAMENT"



It has been two years since I ran a series of stoes in this column on stained glass windows found Orleans County. The project of surveying these ecious forms of local fine art and writing about em has been somewhat fallow but not forgotten. In a quasi sense church windows fall into the ublic domain and therefore, when it comes to fine t, are our major works of art. We have no notable aintings or sculptures in the public domain. If one es architecture as a fine art, we indeed, have

teworthy examples.

The Cobblestone Society Museum has now ecided to have me compile enough material on is subject to publish a 60-page booklet entitled uminaries in the Firmament," (Gen 1:15), A uide To Stained Glass Windows Of Orleans ounty." The book, illustrated with color photoaphs, will have over forty figural stained glass indows found in around twenty churches, repreenting many denominations. The illustrations will arranged in chronological order, telling the ory of the life of Jesus. It will begin with the Old estament, ie: Isaiah's Portrait, Christ Church, bion, followed by New Testament stories and arables such as "The Penitent Woman" from St. ary's Church, Medina, and ending with allegori-il images, an example being: "Christ At The bor," Carlton Methodist.

It will describe and illustrate not only the symblic nature of the windows but will give related storic information of style, maker, costs, etc. any late 19th Century and early 20th Century camples of stained glass, including Tiffany, Pike, ohe, Haskins, Keck, and Lamb windows, plus a w windows from the 1950's will be included. The ook will be edited for liturgical correctness by the ev. Ted Auble, MA, STB, of the Rochester Dioese. Photographs are by Dr. James Orr. The pre-ce will be written by Valerie O'Hara Murray from

the Pike Stained Studio in Rochester.

The cost of publishing a limited edition of a thousand copies of this book in color will burden the Cobblestone Society. Outside financial support is needed and your participation is requested. The book committee made up of William Nestle, James Orr, Evelyn Lyman, Jean Bistoff and C.W. Lattin, has set up the following guidelines for patrons who wish to help. There are several catagories to choose from; Silver Patrons, \$25, Gold Patrons, \$50, and Platinum Patrons, \$100. Patrons will have their names printed in the book under their catagory. In addition, the Platinum Patron is
