This curious photo, made from a glass plate gative, was probably taken in the late 1890's. It unusual for a couple of reasons. First, it is an erior picture which appears to have been done the natural light under a time exposure. We note a man's hand is blurred because he moved. This ser couple are seated around a dining table with ace settings for four. Plunked between them, rhaps on a small stand, is a very large birdcage the a parrot setting on the perch.

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The table is set with plates, silverware and large ass mugs probably filled with water. Perhaps at the water pitcher standing there. A silver disneer (spoon holder) of some sort holds spoons of there is a large silver-plated sugar bowl. In the nter of the table there appears to be a platter

slice on each plate. Even the gentleman is holding a piece. The background displays unframed oil paintings. This suggests to me that perhaps the lady who is pictured, might have been a "Sunday Painter." Let me clarify — a Sunday painter is one who dabbles at art only, and does not make it a profession. "Sunday Painter" is applied to the person who does something else for a living during the week but paints on sundays. At any rate, who ever did these paintings probably copied some picture out of a magazine as the scenes do not appear to be local.
