## THE BENTON CORNERS SCHOOL

Our photo this week shows the Town of Albion
District No. 2 School House in 1916. The school
vas located just north of Benton's Corners on
Route 98 south of Moore-Nesbitt Inc. The structure, is currently the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Wil-

am Seager.
Sixteen students making up the school's popution, pose with their teacher. To the right, we see tree adults including two women standing and a nan laying on the ground. These three are per-

aps, parents or school-connected officials. Some of the students, none of whom are identied, show an item of interest. The boy in the front enter, poses with a rather large old-time football. boy behind, shows a partially finished basket-eaving project. The girl next to him holds a note-ook. The boy to the far right, holds a net for peraps catching specimens of butterflies. These bjects certainly signify that these students, over ighty years ago, were receiving a well-rounded ducation in a common school.

Let us now focus upon what's in the backround. First, the flagpole, and a pole it is. We may ssume that someone in the district went to the oods and simply cut a very tall, straight, slender se and made it into a flag pole. Indeed, the first ag poles were just that.

As to the schoolhouse, what a neat, trim, prisne and well kept structure it appears to be. The belfry has a stripe of a different color painted in the roof shingles. The windows are all outfitted with blinds (shutters) with the ones in front being closed. The transom over the front door is even shuttered. In the gable we note the plaque which states "Albion District No. 2, 1884". To the rear of the school house is a privy or outhouse. A board fence surrounds the property. Note the absence of any shrubbery on the grounds in relationship to the building.

From a news clipping about the district published in 1932, it indicates that an old school ledger states: "The property of the Second School District in Barre bought by Almeron Tripp, Clerk, Nov. 24, 1838. Keep your records just and true and no quarrels will ensue". Good advice even now. In 1875 the north part of the Town of Barre was subdivided to create the Town of Albion where this school district was then located.

The cost of running the district in 1837-38 was \$126.62. In 1848 Oliver Wolcott got a contract for 18 cords of wood at \$3.00 per cord to heat the school. In 1897 just one hundred years ago the teacher was paid \$180.00 for 36 weeks of instruction. In 1907 the teacher earned \$396.00 for the same number of weeks.

The first school house in the district was built some time between 1820-1825. The one pictured here was built in 1884. In 1932 there were 52 taxpayers in the district. The school closed prior to 1952 and thereafter the students of the district were sent to Albion.
