GEORGE W. POSSON 1850-1915

George Warner Posson was born in the Town of Shelby on Oct. 2, 1850. He was the youngest of five children of Cornelius V. and Artemesia Posson, pioneer settlers of that town.

In fact, Posson Road takes its name from

this early Orleans County family.

George Posson was raised on his family's farm and received his early education in the rural schools. He took his high education at Medina and Knowlesville High Schools before attending Brockport State Normal

In 1873, Mr. Posson married Jennie M. Clute of Shelby and they had four children who were: Mrs. R.F. Bourn, Mrs. Chester Hakes, Mrs. Artemesia Traver and Howard
