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n Oct. 16, 1860, William G. and Emma E. Swan were married, and hey made their home in Albion. In 1877, they built a arge mansion at the southeast corner of routes 98 and Il in the village.

On April 2, 1895, William idded a codicil to his will, tating that he intended to build a public library in Albion. If he should die efore this was carried out, is executors were then lirected to complete it. Villiam and Emma Swan egan traveling and looking t libraries, both at home nd abroad, in an effort to lan one for Albion. However, on Nov. 10, 1896.

Villiam died, leaving 35,000 for establishing a brary and two executors to omplete the work. The xecutors were his wife, mma, (1836-1904) and ıdge Isaac Signor (1842-

Consequently, it was Mrs. wan who gave largely of er time to make the library reality, a fitting memorial her late husband. It was rough her influences and ecisions shaping the brary, along with those of ignor, that the library came out.
