"Western New York has a itizen with a remarkable ollection of memories of braham Lincoln. John H. tevens was born in 1840 in Inowlesville, Orleans county, in the house where e has lived ever since, with ne exception of his term of ervice in the United States

"He enlisted on August 7, 62, in Company A, 151st ew York Infantry, and was ounded in the battle of line Run on Friday, ovember 27, 1863. "In 1864 he was transrred to a medical survey ompany at Baltimore, Md. id was present at the mination of Abraham ncoln for President for a cond term on June 7, 1864. "That September he was insferred to Washington, C. and was assigned to ity in the medical bureau the provost marshall neral's office and was esent at the inauguration



on March 4, 1865. He was also present at Ford's Theater on April 14, 1865 when Lincoln was shot by J. Wilkes Booth. He says that nobody in the theater knew of the assassination until it was announced by the President's wife."
