4-H poultry project 1939

he following information is taken from the annual report of the 4-H Club Department of the Orleans County Farm and Home Bureau of 1939. Last week, this column contained a story from the same report on a dress review; this week it's the boys' turn.

The-photo shows Warren Morse, a Buffalo boy who lived outside Medina during the summer, with ducks he raised and sold before returning to school. Thirty-seven boys and one girl enrolled in the poultry project, with 28 boys and one girl completing it. More than 2,500 chickens were raised by the 4-H members in 1939. Gross income on all poultry projects was \$2,795.32, a net income of \$1,002.64.

One of the outstanding accomplishments was that of George Becker of Medina. He worked out and put on a demonstration entitled, "The Drawing and Trussing of a Chicken." He later placed third in a statewide contest where he won, a trip to the World's Poultry Congress.

advised to get their chicks from nearby poultry men. Several club members go chicks through the Albion FFA department. On member sold 150 crossbred pullets at a profit of \$6,702, over costs for feed and labor. Another 4-H member with 116 Rock & Red crossbred chicks averaged 196 eggs per bird. They returned \$1.41 per bird over costs for labor and feed.

Robert Bauer of Holley raised turkeys and ended up getting 30 cents per pound, showing a nice profit.
