He was a mascot at many American Legion events, firemen's parades and humanitarian causes. He was indeed a social butterfly and always wore a vest denoting some cause or group. His attire also usually included a corn cob pipe he held in his teeth and a pair of sunglasses.

DiPalma often said, "The reason he has so many friends is he wags his tail instead of his tongue!"

Muggs is fondly remembered by those who knew him. He is buried in the pet cemetery at Hornell.
