

Baptist meeting house

This fine example of Federal style architecture once stood on Main Street in Albion. It was built in 1832 by Albion Baptists for their meeting house.

The congregation was organized in 1830 out of the Gaines Baptist Church.

This building was used until 1860 when the present First **Baptist** Church on West Park Street was dedi-



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cated. Because of successful revival meetings in the 1850's the Albion congregation increased in size thereby outgrowing the Street.

Following its use for around 1892. The lot stood sides of the church. Hence

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vacant until 1907 when the IOOF built their Lodge on the site. The building to the left was the residence of Roswell Burrows built in 1851. In 1899 the structure was transformed into Swan Library.

It's interesting to note that before the Village Hall was built on East Bank Street in 1873, the bell in the tower of this meeting house was used s the village fire alarm. We also notice a clock in the bell

The facade of this buildold meeting house on Main ing had three front doors which was somewhat typical of church architecture worship the building was of this time frame. This used as a concert hall and goes back to when men was finally torn down and women sat on separate women went in the left door and men went in the right door. However, when the services were oer, the entire congregation made its exit through the middle door. Thus the preacher could greet everyone on the way out.

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
