

## Mt. Albion Ghost Walk

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Albion Cemetery produced and provided by students of Albion High School will take place this Satrday. Departure times from the Albion Primary School by shuttle bus will be in 15 minute intervals from 5 to 9 p.m. Please call for \$5 reserved tickets at 589-2087. The rain date is Oct. 20.

The map shown here of Mt. Albion Cemetery was published in 1879 in the Illustrated Historical Albion of Orleans County. This shows the cemetery in it developmental years before the configuration as we now know it.

On this map the eastern two thirds to the left was the original cemetery land from 1843. In 1874 the western one third of this map to the right was purchased. In 1884 another 30 acres to the west was purchased and also developed into burial plots. This newer portion of Mt. Albion is nt therefore included on this earlier map.

This year's proceeds of the tour will be directed to the cemetery for finishing off the iron gazebo in the section known as Dogwood Park.
